

PHISHING SCAMS June 25th, 2021

Just a reminder to everyone to be alert to possible phishing scams that sometimes have a convincing and legitimate appearance. The best advice is to be very suspicious and remain on guard. **Never tap or click links in messages.** Look up website addresses and other information to verify their validity. Below is an example of a recently received suspicious e-mail, which contained hyperlinks and limited information to prove validity.

Be vigilant to avoid being a victim of scams.

Hello, good day. I am Mark, an alumnus of this college.

I am emailing you regarding a dog sitting job opportunity. I have an uncle, Michael, who is moving to the College area all the way from Canada. He will be needing the services of a dog sitter whose duties will be sitting, bathing, and walking his dogs.

He is Offering \$400 weekly and he is also ready to pay for any overtime too. Should you be interested or know a student/staff who might be, send an email to Michael via (m####g101@o####k) Also make sure to include your phone number in the email so He can get back to you.
